- (1) Pick as many written sources as you desire (novels, studies, articles, advertisements, newspapers, etc.);
- (2) Pick 5-10 English prepositions to work with [i.e. of, with, at, to, in, for, until, among, on, by, about, like, etc.];
- (3) Every time you encounter one of these prepositions in your texts, copy down all of the text occurring prior to the preposition, as well as the preposition itself;
- (4) Next, jump to a different text source, begin reading this source by locating an instance of the SAME preposition you came across in the other text source.
- (5) Repeat steps 3 & 4 until your interest evaporates

Example:

The result of...your foot, your knee bending slightly as you take in...a magic lantern; this is fancy, but we do not attribute it to...know seems on the outside to...be the case. If...the world had a goal, it must have been reached by...some animals below the grade of... humor.
